





2012 Food Policy and Program Survey for Local Governments

The International City/County Management Association (ICMA) and Michigan State University (MSU)'s Center for Regional Food Systems conducted this survey to collect data on what local governments are doing in relation to food system development. The following definition of food systems was provided: **Food systems include all of the stakeholders, processes, and linkages involved in taking food from farm to plate.**




