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Municipal Form of Government, 2001

The 2001 *Municipal Form of Government* surveys were mailed in summer 2001 and winter 2002 to the Municipal Clerks in municipalities with populations 2,500 and over and to those municipalities under 2,500 in population that are in ICMA's database. Of the 7,867 municipalities that received surveys, 4,244 responded (54.0%).
