Previous he served Deputy City Manager in for The City of Lynchburg and as the Town Manager of Ashland, Virginia for over thirteen years. He also previously served as the Town Manager for the Virginia communities of Middleburg and Gate City. Mr. Hargrove spoke on his path and experiences from serving in small towns to his position at The City of Lynchburg. The final session was held on January 25 featuring Matt Hankins. Matt currently serves as Assistant Town Manager & Community Development Director in Rocky Mount as well as The Chief Executive Officer of the Harvester Performance Center. Matt provided an excellent presentation on the background of the success and economic impact of the Harvester Performance Center in Rocky Mount.
